Within small groups, and together with a teacher, students will work together to tell a story. Because these books have no words, students must use their background knowledge to create a story that matches the pictures. First the teacher models using new vocabulary related to the seasons and weather and a story structure with a beginning, middle, and end. Then it's the students'
