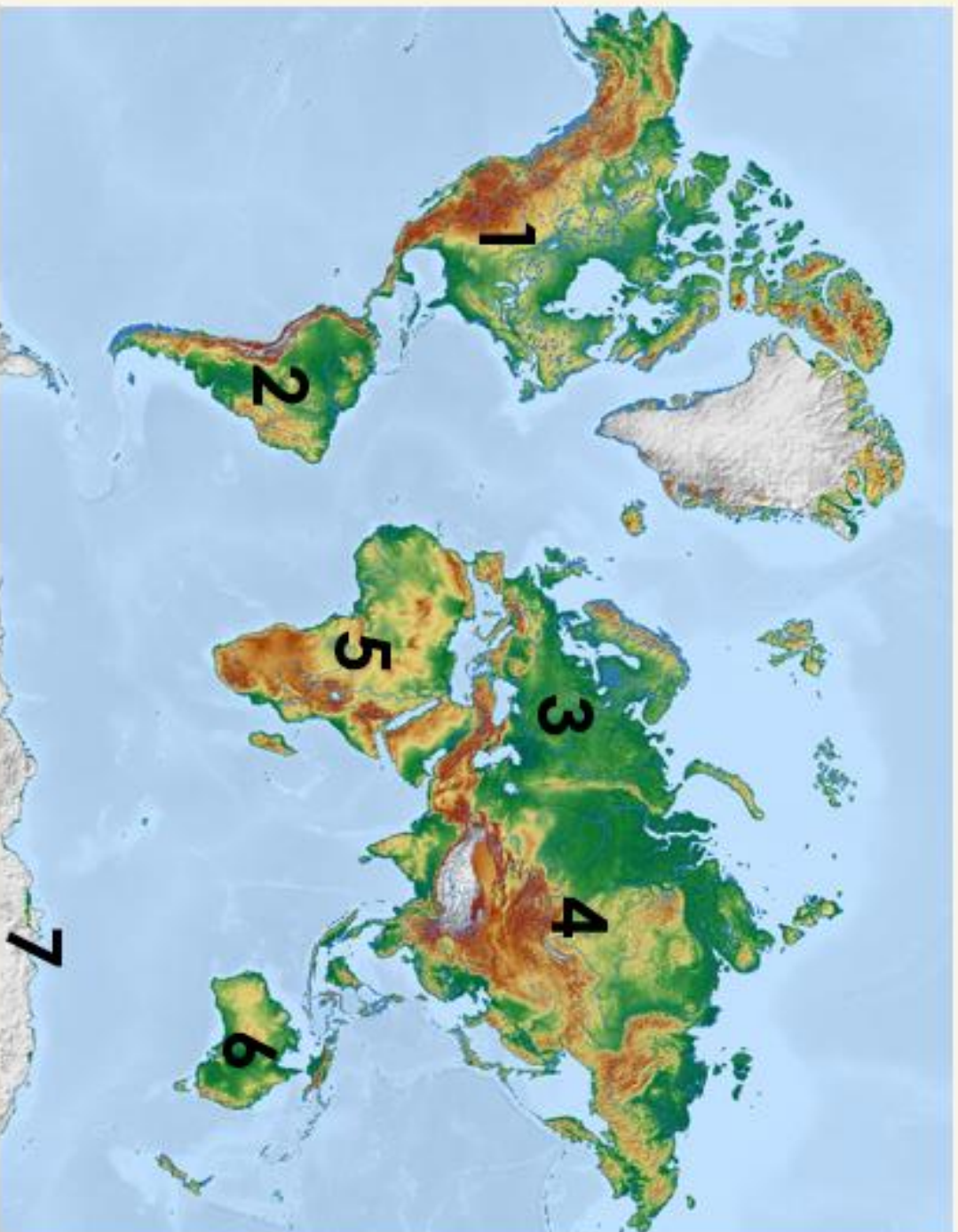

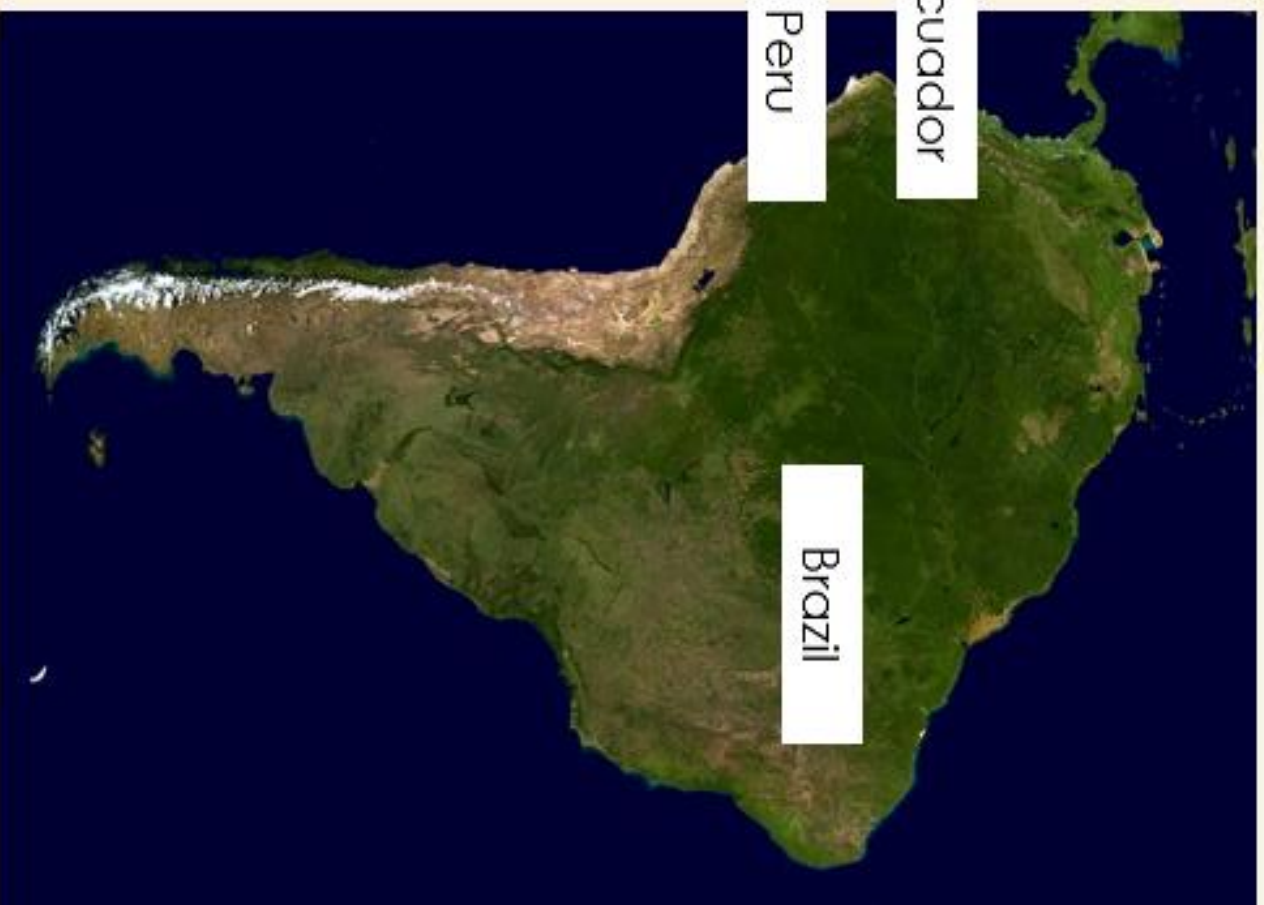

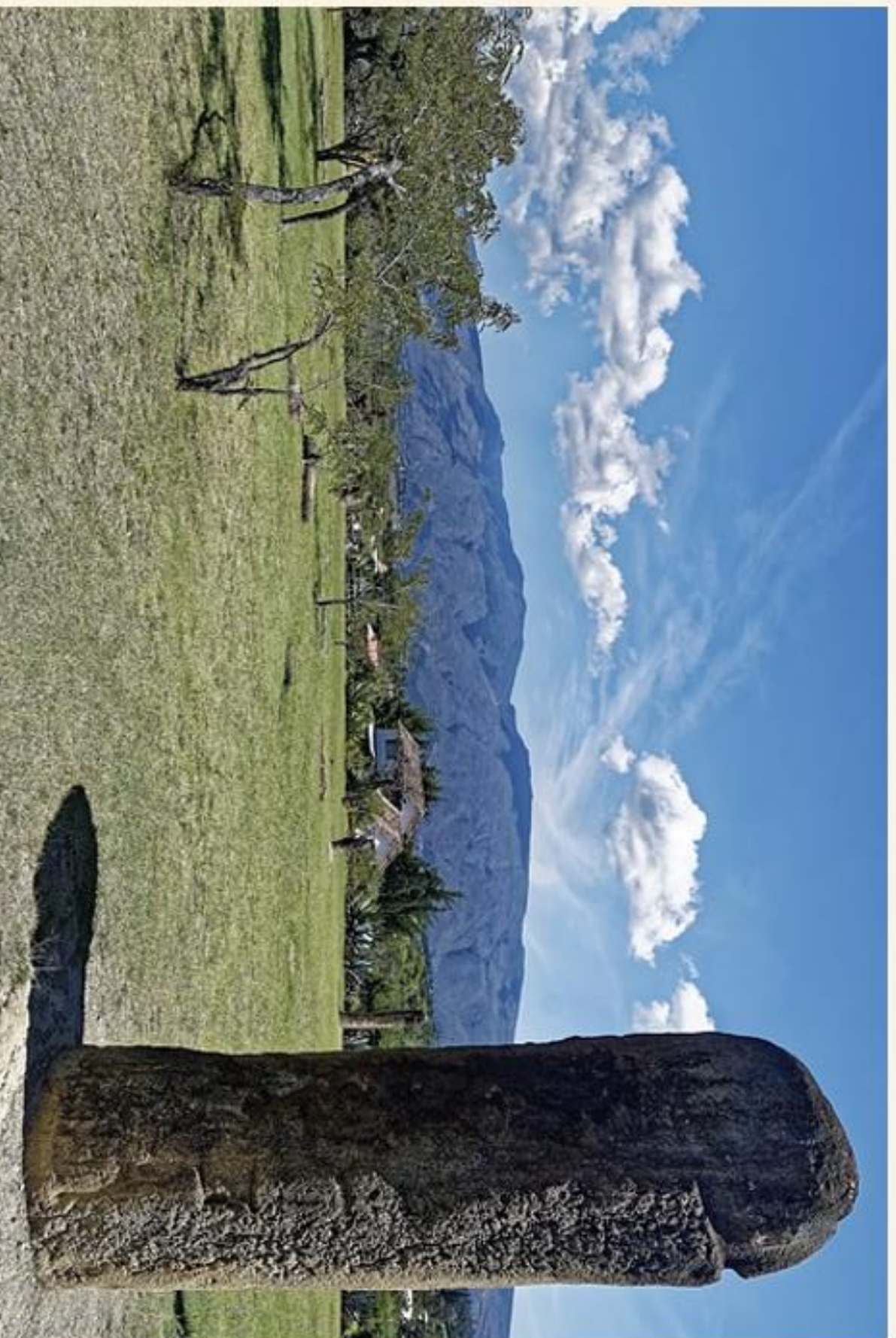

Sloths and macaws live in the rainforest.



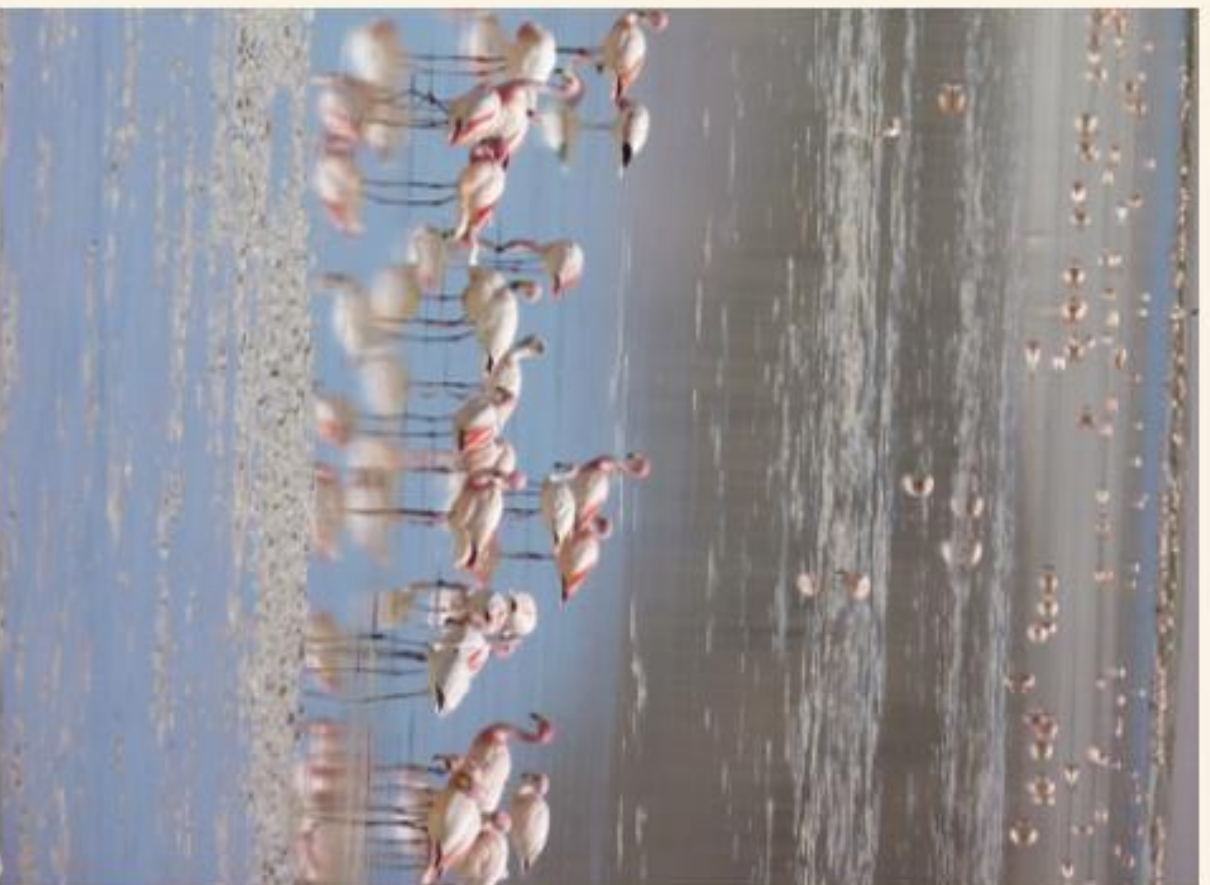
There are flat, green grasslands with bushy shrubs.

Maned wolves and armadillos live in the grasslands.



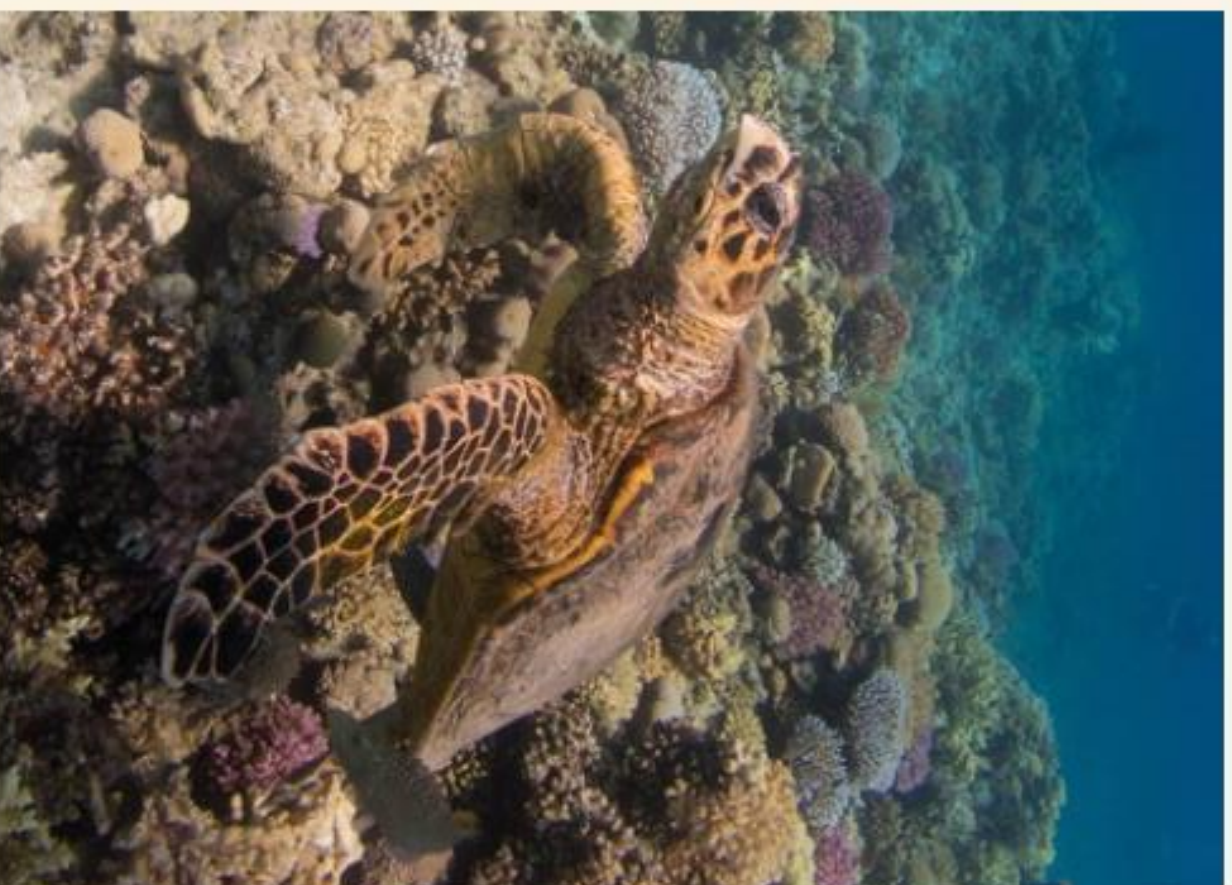
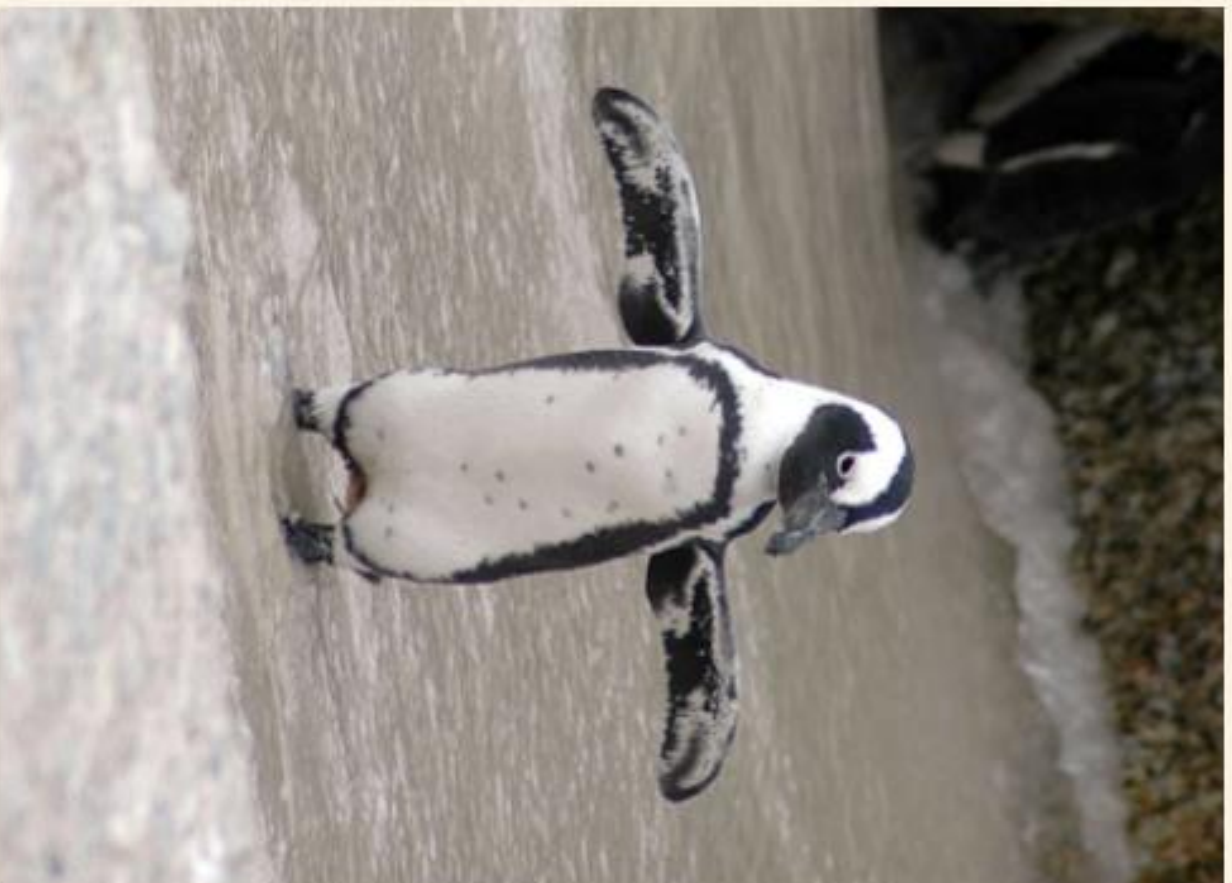
There are dry deserts that get very little rain.

There are twelve countries in South America but hundreds of different languages are spoken here.

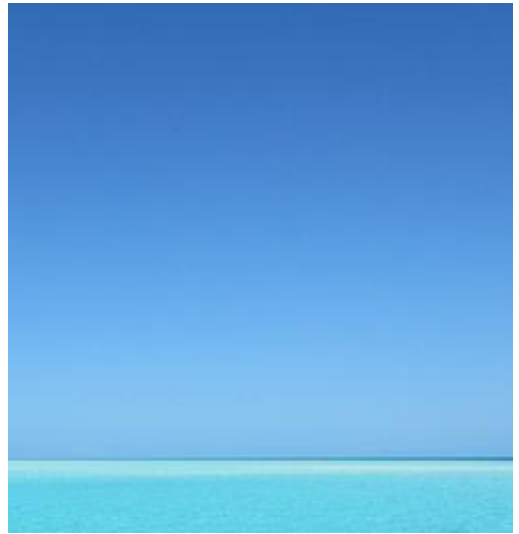

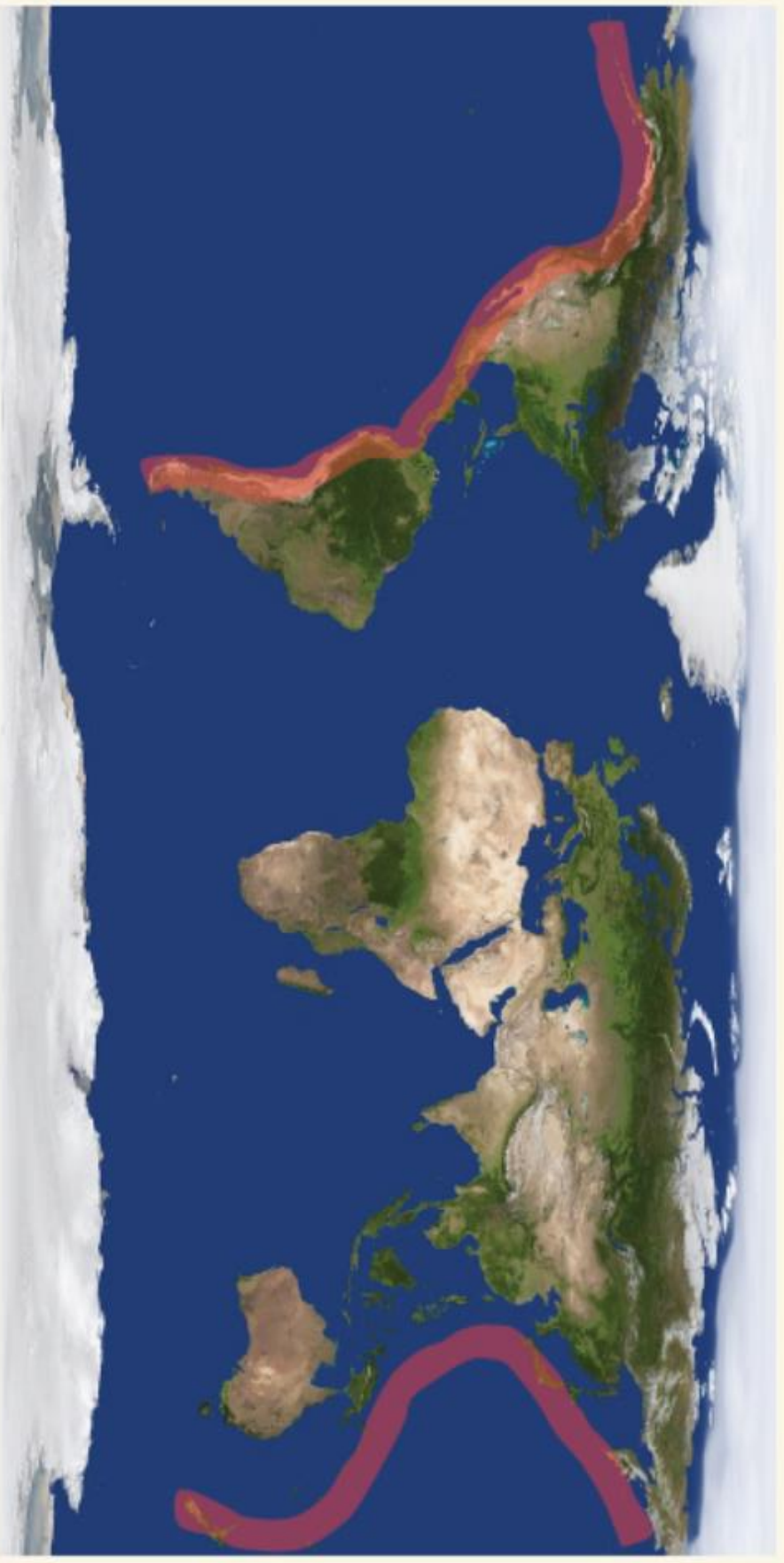


Volcanoes

Most of the time volcanoes are calm and peaceful. Sometimes they are explosive and dangerous. Why is that? What is a volcano and what makes it so destructive?



There are volcanoes all around the world. Most volcanoes are near the **coastline** of continents. When you look at the location of volcanoes on a round globe, you will see the shape of a circle. Some people call this the Ring of Fire.



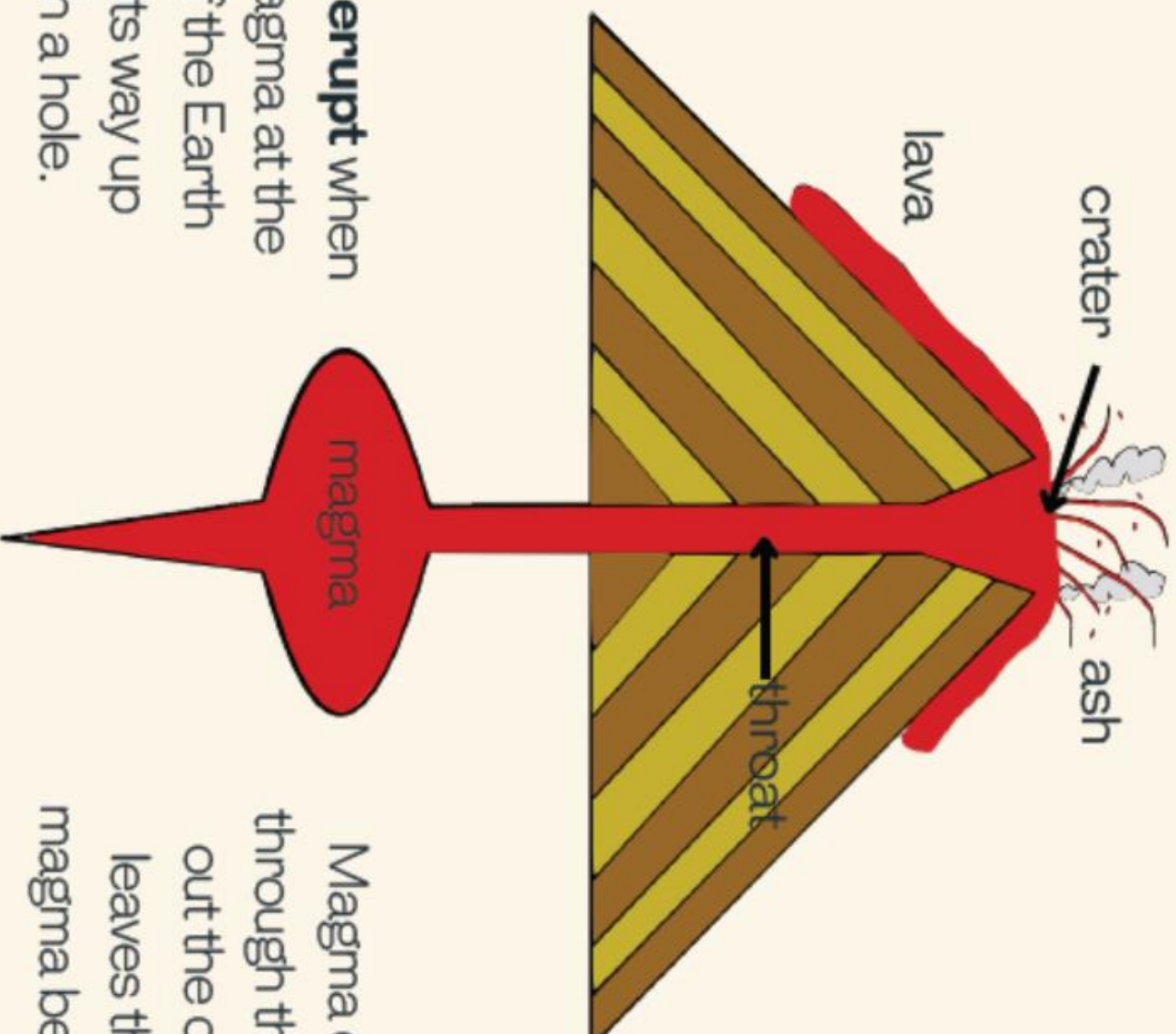


There are more than 200 volcanoes in South America. Most of the volcanoes are part of the Andes mountains, or the altiplano region.



Volcanoes are openings in the earth where magma can escape. Volcanoes can look like holes, hills, or even tall mountains.

Eruption!



Volcanoes **erupt** when the hot magma at the center of the Earth pushes its way up through a hole.

Magma escapes up through the throat and out the crater. As it leaves the volcano, magma becomes **lava**.

Lava

Lava is extremely hot! It glows red as it flows from the volcano. Eventually lava cools and becomes rock. Over time, the rock breaks down and makes the **soil** rich with nutrients. That is why many people grow food and crops near volcanoes.

2 Dormant- a volcano that hasn't erupted in awhile but might erupt again

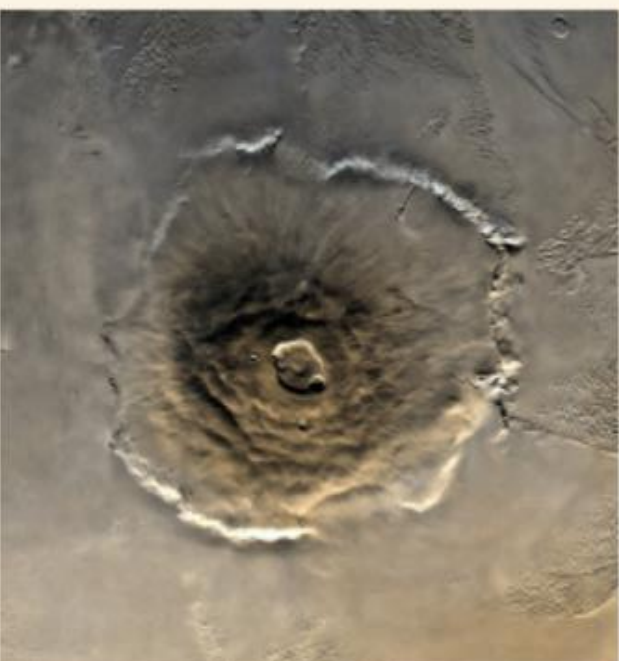
3 Extinct- a volcano that hasn't erupted in a long time and isn't expected to erupt again
